

Bristol's Shape Shifting History: Celebrating 650 years with communities across the city

As part of a National Lottery Heritage Funded project coordinated by Bristol Ideas celebrating the 650th anniversary of Bristol as an independent county, Local Learning is working with communities across the city exploring our local heritage to create a community atlas showing how Bristol has grown.

After the Second World War, Bristol needed more land for house building. The last significant extension to the city in 1951 pushed Bristol out to its southern limit, bringing the medieval village of Bishopsworth into the city area and leading to the construction of Withywood, Hartcliffe and Stockwood.

Focusing on growing up in Hartcliffe and Withywood, school life and learning outside of the classroom, we would like to explore what education means for local people today and in the past.
